

‘Roots to Prosperity’ is a transformative journey led by Contact Base and supported by Axis Bank Foundation. The initiative aspires to empower traditional cultural practitioners as confident cultural entrepreneurs, while strengthening the ecosystem of heritage-based tourism. It works across the districts of Koraput and Mayurbhanj in Odisha, and Seraikela-Kharsawan in Jharkhand—regions endowed with natural beauty and deep reservoirs of indigenous artistry and living traditions.

Across these culturally rich landscapes, the project walks alongside more than 5,500 rural creative practitioners. It supports them to refine skills, access markets directly, build strong community-led enterprises, and shape vibrant cultural tourism experiences. At its core, the initiative recognises that culture is more than memory—it is identity, dignity, and possibility.



About the Craft

Wood carving is a long-standing craft practiced across India for both functional and decorative use. In Girla village of Odisha, this tradition has been carried forward by artisan families for over two decades, reflecting continuity, skill, and cultural knowledge passed down through generations. Rooted in the tribal regions of Koraput, Girla woodcraft draws on locally sourced wood and everyday experiences of forest life. Artisans carve religious figures, household objects, and utilitarian forms, combining practical needs with simple, detailed design. The craft reflects a close relationship with nature and community life, making Girla's wood carving a living practice shaped by experience, heritage, and sustained livelihood.



Location

Located in the Koraput district of southern Odisha, Girma village lies amidst forested landscapes and rolling hills that shape the region's tribal way of life. The village has emerged as a key centre for traditional woodcraft, where locally available timber is transformed into handcrafted utility and decorative objects.





How To Reach

The closest railway station to reach Girma is Jagdalpur. The nearest airports are at Jeypore (around 50 kms from Kotpad), Jagdalpur (33 kms from Kotpad) and Visakhapatnam (about 285 kms from Kotpad), offering convenient access from major cities. Regular buses and taxis connect Kotpad with nearby towns like Rayagada, Nabarangpur, and Jagdalpur.

The artists of Girla create a wide and versatile range of handcrafted wood products. Their work includes intricately carved furniture such as chairs, tables, cabinets, and stools, designed for everyday use. Alongside furniture, they produce tribal figurines and decorative home décor pieces, extending to hand-carved religious and artistic sculptures. In recent years, artisans have diversified further into wooden beaded jewellery and small utility items, adapting their skills to contemporary tastes while retaining the essence of Girla's carving heritage.
